ENTRY FORMS

RULES

- 1. The name of the Festival shall be the Mary Wakefield Westmorland Festival.
- In order to comply with Federation rules as to length of sessions for adjudicators, it is not practicable for all entries from an individual or school to be heard during the same session. Nor will all classes necessarily be held in order of their class number.
- 3. Those who take part in the Festival shall be choirs and individuals from towns, villages and schools in the old County of Westmorland or within a radius of thirty miles of Kendal.
- 4. No performer shall be allowed to rehearse or practise class work during the week of the Festival in a hall in which the class is to take place.
- 5. In cases where an age limit is stipulated, performers must be within the age limit stated. Age limits stated in the Prospectus signify the school year in which the child is placed. To give an example, school year 6 signifies that the performer has his/her 11th birthday during the period 1st September 2022 to 31st August 2023. Please note that school year 13 is the maximum for age-restricted classes and a birth certificate should be produced, if requested. Note: Performers not in full-time education must still be within the appropriate age group.
- 6. In adult vocal classes, performers must be 19 or over at the date of the Festival.
- 7. All test pieces are the performer's own choice, except where specified. The performer MUST provide a copy of the music for the adjudicator's use before the class begins, but preferably with the entry form. This can be a photocopy if the piece is part of a volume, the photocopy to be retained by the Festival and destroyed. Items are not to exceed 5 minutes' duration unless otherwise specified in individual class qualifications. Where a time limit is stipulated, performers are expected to fill the majority of the time available. No performer is allowed to repeat a chosen item in any other class.
- 8. No photocopies may be used at the Festival, other than those obtained through a publisher's Uniprint Service, or copyright-free download, or as provided in Rule 7 above.
- 9. Songs from the Shows classes: No full costume or dance routines are allowed. However, movement, gesture and simple props, such as a chair, are acceptable.
- 10. All instrumental groups must be in the hall before the commencement of the class. A limited time will be given for setting up instrumental groups.
- 11. No change of performer or choice of piece will be allowed once the Programme has gone to print. If a change is made after this time, then an adjudication will be given but no placing or Certificate will be awarded.
- 12. The use of any audio or visual recording equipment at any time during the Festival is strictly forbidden. The Festival may appoint a photographer, designated by a badge, or allow a press photographer to attend. Photographs taken during the Festival will be used only for publicity purposes connected with the Festival. Parents who object to children being photographed while taking part in the Festival must inform the Chief Steward in writing in advance. Persons using recording equipment of any kind may be asked to leave.
- 13. Trophies won by a performer or performers entered by a school MUST be retained at the school and not taken home by performers. They must be returned on request.

January 2023. Each entry must be made on a separate entry form (may be photocopied) and must be sent with the correct fee. Entry forms may be submitted by post or emailed to the email address above. - Performers may provide their own accompanist, but an Official Accompanist will be available if required at no cost to the performer. Performers requiring the services of the Official Accompanist must send a copy of their music with their entry. No alteration can be made to this arrangement without the agreement of the Official Accompanist.
- 2. Trophies are held for two years and must be returned **in good condition** when requested.
- 3. Adjudicators' marking sheets and music copies must be collected after each class.
- 4. The rules relating to individual classes are stated under the class headings.

Particular attention will be paid to technical and artistic merit and potential for the future.

A separate panel will adjudicate the final on Friday, 17th March, in Kendal Town Hall, during the Festival Showcase Concert.

OUR ADJUDICATORS



Belinda Mikhail, BMus(Hons), PgDipRCM, ARCM, EMT

Belinda Mikhaïl was awarded the Associated Board and the Queen Mother Scholarships to study piano and singing as a joint first study at the Royal College of Music where she won the Hopkinson Gold Medal for her final recital. Since graduating she has travelled extensively performing both as a soloist and as a chamber musician and has appeared as a concerto soloist at the major London Concert Halls.

She has made numerous recordings for Sony BMG and Universal and is a vocal soloist on EMI's Vocalise album as used in trailers for ER, Lost and Grey's Anatomy. She appears as the featured soloist on many film soundtracks and her solo piano playing of the theme from Chariots of Fire was heard at every medal ceremony at the London Olympic Games.

Belinda is also in demand as a vocal coach for classical, pop and rock singers and runs an extensive private teaching practice. She has trained performers as diverse as Siouxsie Sioux, Jennifer Ellison, Jack Garrett, Cathy Tyson, the Oscar-winning actress Juliette Binoche, as well as the world-renowned dancer Akram Khan. Her students are enjoying major roles in theatre companies up and down the country as well as West End Shows such as Anything Goes, Chicago, Dreamgirls, Haddestown, Dirty Dancing, Book of Mormon and High School Musical, and the hit TV series, Bridgerton, Downton Abbey and Broadchurch.

Belinda's work as an adjudicator has seen her travel extensively; she was invited to Trinidad and Tobago where she adjudicated their month long biennial Music Festival and future trips will see her travel to both Sri Lanka and Hong Kong. She thoroughly enjoys listening to a wide variety of music and meeting a wealth of musicians as she travels in her role as an adjudicator for the BIFF.



Daniel Chandler, BMus(Hons), MA

Daniel received his early musical education on the Fylde Coast in Lancashire. After studying in Manchester, he was awarded a place at the Royal College of Music in London where he studied with the renowned flautist and teacher, Susan Milan. As well as gaining a degree from the RCM, Daniel has a teaching qualification from Edge Hill University and a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership and Management from the University of Warwick.

For a number of years, Daniel was Director of Music at AKS Lytham; a leading coeducational independent school situated in Lytham St. Anne's. He directed the AKS Choral Society, Junior and Senior School Choirs, Girls' Choir, Concert Band and a successful Swing Band in numerous performances in the UK and further afield. This included concerts in Westminster Abbey, Salzburg Cathedral, the Rhine valley in Germany, as well as performances in St. Paul's Chapel next to Ground Zero and at the United Nations in New York.

Daniel is currently Assistant Head of Bolton Music Service. He now works with all sectors of the local community to increase access to quality music making, to raise standards of music education across schools and academies, and to provide exciting musical pathways for children through tuition as well as regional and national ensembles.

Daniel still manages to find time to continue performing, deliver workshops and adjudicate as a member of the British and International Federation of Festivals.



Child Protection Policy Statement

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm.

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers, safely ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training. The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

Safer Festivals Statement

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to provide Safer Festivals for children, young people and vulnerable adults:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival.
- 3. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection leaflets, support and training for all Federation Festival staff and volunteers, including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures followed for all new staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for the children and young people attending / performing at our Festivals.
- 5. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival.
- 6. All Festival staff and volunteers wear a badge to identify their roles and all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition each Festival will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 7. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, performance, practice and changing areas that may be provided.
- 8. No unauthorised photography or video recording of children and young people is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 9. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and Safer Festivals Statement will be published explicitly in the syllabus, the Programme and on the Festival's website. Each teacher/parent/guardian/carer must read, understand and accept this information in order to give consent for their children/pupils to enter the festival by box ticking and signing the appropriate section of the physical Festival Entry Form or Online Entry Procedure. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

PRIVACY POLICY

The General Data Protection Regulations become law on 25th May 2018. They enforce stricter rules about the holding of information by the Mary Wakefield Festival and the uses to which that information is put.

The Information we hold

The information the Mary Wakefield Festival holds for entrants, parents and teachers is as follows:

- Name of entrant
- Name of responsible person or teacher
- Name, postal address, email address, phone number of entrant or responsible person or teacher
- Instrument played and whether the Official Accompanist is required
- Fee applicable and date of payment

We hold this information for the purposes of administration of the Festival – acknowledgement of entries, timetabling, notification of venue and timing of classes.

Only the name of the entrant will be shown in the Festival Programme.

Entrants or their responsible adult or teacher MUST sign where shown on the Entry Form to show that they consent to their information being used in this way. Without a signature on an Entry Form we cannot accept that entry. An electronic signature is acceptable on an emailed Entry Form.

Children aged 13 or over are able to provide their own consent as the lawful basis for processing personal data.

Children have the same rights as adults over their personal data. These include the rights to access their personal data; request rectification; object to processing and have their personal data erased.

A column will be added to the database on which this information is recorded, showing the date when consent was given.

Protection of Information

This information is held on a back-up drive by the Entries Secretary. Entry forms are held for the duration of the Festival and then destroyed.

Your information is held securely and can be accessed only by certain members of the Festival Committee: the Secretary, the Entries Secretary and members of the timetabling group. It will not be communicated to any third party without your permission.

Privacy Notice

The following privacy notice will be included on all emails:

Your information is stored securely, and will be used only for the purposes of the Mary Wakefield Festival. If at any time you wish to stop receiving these emails, or if your contact details have changed, simply reply to the Secretary, who will make the change, usually within 24 hours.

Procedure for answering access requests

Requests for information held by the Mary Wakefield Festival will be answered within one month, and at no cost to the applicant.
