Welcome to the 71st Mary Wakefield Westmorland Festival 2017

As we look forward to 2017 I'm delighted to announce new, exciting changes to the format of the Festival.

In order to avoid the crippling cost of staging the Choral Concert, the Festival Chorus and Cumbria Choral Initiative have merged to form the Cumbria Festival Chorus. This independent body will promote choral events throughout each year and, as its contribution to the Festival, will stage a 'come and sing' Elijah in July 2017.

The committee is now free to explore ways of developing our competitions, non-competitive events and workshop days and we have extended the geographical range to 30 miles radius of Kendal, hoping to attract further schools and individual entries.

Our aim has always been to provide a friendly and encouraging platform for performers of all ages to test their skills and "pace each other on the way to excellence" (Sir Walford Davies) and we hope this side of our work will continue to prosper. Our inaugural 'Jazz, Rock and Pop' day in 2015 proved a great success and, it is hoped, will attract even more participants this time round.

We listen carefully to all suggestions and comments and, as a result, have relaxed the guidelines for the 'Songs from the Shows' classes, removed the lower age limits for the instrumental classes and introduced a new Novice, non-competitive event for anyone, young or old, who has been learning their chosen instrument for two years or less. We hope many will take the chance to celebrate their music making in a relaxed and non-judgemental environment.

In 2015 we were delighted to receive generous class and event sponsorship and to hear many personal reminiscences of past Festivals when trophies were presented. Your generosity not only helps to keep this unique Festival alive but binds generations of music makers together.

Our schools workshops will continue outside of Festival week and they will present 'Joseph and his Technicolor Dreamcoat' in October 2016, followed by 'Ocean World' on a date still to be fixed, in 2017.

I have always been passionate about the work of the Festival and feel privileged to have been elected Chairman of one of the oldest competitive Festivals in the country. I look forward to welcoming Festival friends and many new faces to the varied events which form our 2017 Festival.

Westmorland Music Trust

The change from the Westmorland Music Council to the Westmorland Music Trust now well established, the Trust is continuing to build on the valuable work done over many decades by its predecessor. In addition we are now actively looking for new ways, as an enabling body, to be helpful to all music-making and music-promoting organisations in the region.

Perhaps the most noticeable innovation so far is the development of the Concert Diary. This has been published twice a year for a long time now, in printed form. In a very recent development however, it is now available online via our website. This has at least two advantages: It gives concert organisers who are considering organising a concert a much more up-to-the-minute view of who is doing what around the date being considered. As soon as a date is fixed it can go onto the web-based concert diary almost immediately instead of having to wait in some cases nearly six months for the printed version to be published.

We are also trying to achieve much closer collaboration between organisations in the matter of programme building in an attempt to avoid an inadvertent juxtaposition of many performances of the same piece.

Over the coming weeks and months other innovations will be discussed and refined by our new Development Committee. At the same time of course we are continuing with our traditional role of grant aid to our young musicians to help with their studies. To this end we are constantly on the lookout for opportunities to attract new funds so that we can keep this important activity going. We are particularly fortunate in being the administrator of the Katharine Pottinger Fund which is of specific benefit to young singers.

RULES

- 1. The name of the Festival shall be the Mary Wakefield Westmorland Festival.
- 2. The Festival shall be organised by a sub-committee of the Westmorland Music Trust. The sub-committee shall consist of members of the Westmorland Music Trust with power to co-opt up to three-quarters of its members.
- 3. Those who take part in the Festival shall be choirs and individuals from towns, villages and schools in the old County of Westmorland or within a radius of thirty miles from Kendal.
- 4. No performer shall be allowed to rehearse or practise class work during the week of the Festival in a hall in which the class is to take place.
- 5. In classes where an age limit is stipulated, performers must be within the age limit stated. Age limits stated in the Prospectus signify the school year in which the children are placed. To give an example, school year 6 signifies that the performer has his/her 11th birthday during the period 1st September 2016 to 31st August 2017. Please note that school year 13 is the maximum for age restricted classes and that birth certificates should be produced, if requested. Note: Performers not in full time education must still be within the appropriate age group.
- 6. All test pieces are the performer's own choice except where specified. The performer must provide a copy of the music for the adjudicator's use **before the class begins**, but preferably with the entry form. This can be a photocopy if the piece is part of a volume. Photocopy to be retained by the Festival and destroyed. Items not to exceed 5 minutes' duration unless otherwise specified in individual class qualifications.
- 7. The use of all audio or visual recording equipment at any time during the Festival is **strictly forbidden.** The Festival may appoint a photographer, designated by a badge, or allow a Press photographer to attend. Photographs taken during the Festival will only be used for publicity purposes connected with the Festival. Parents who object to children being photographed while taking part in the Festival must inform the Chief Steward in writing in advance. Persons in possession of audio or visual recording equipment may be refused admission.
- 8. No photocopies may be used at the Festival, other than those obtained through a publisher's Uniprint Service, or copyright-free download, or as provided in Rule 6 above.
- 9. Songs from the Shows classes: No full costume or dance routines are allowed. However, movement, gesture and simple props (such as a chair) are acceptable.
- 10. All instrumental groups must be in the Hall before the commencement of the class. A limited time will be given for setting up instrumental groups.

Cheques should be made payable to Mary Wakefield Festival. Payment may also be made by Bank Transfer – bank details on request.

Details of a performer's music in own-choice classes must be given on the entry form for inclusion in the Adjudicated Classes programme. Confirmation of entry will be sent by email where possible – please ensure that you add your email address to **both** sections of the form.

- 2. Trophies are held for two years and must be returned **in good condition** when requested.
- 3. Adjudicators' marking sheets must be collected after each class.
- 4. The rules relating to individual classes are stated under the class headings.

Child Protection Policy Statement

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year. The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the
 right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm.

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- · valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers, safely ensuring all necessary checks are made
- · sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children
 appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.



Safer Festivals Statement

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to provide Safer Festivals for children and young people:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection leaflets, support and training for all Federation Festival staff and volunteers, including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 3. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures followed for all new staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for the children and young people attending / performing at our Festivals.
- 4. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival.
- 5. All Festival staff and volunteers wear a badge to identify their roles and all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition each Festival will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, performance, practice and changing areas that may be provided.
- 7. No unauthorised photography or video recording of children and young people is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 8. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and Safer Festivals Statement will be published explicitly in the syllabus, the Programme and on the Festival's website. Each teacher/parent/guardian/carer must read, understand and accept this information in order to give consent for their children/pupils to enter the festival by box ticking and signing the appropriate section of the physical Festival Entry Form or Online Entry Procedure. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.
